

## Distinguished Dairy Cattle Breeder Doug Maddox

The dairy industry lost a tremendous leader on December 19, 2011 with the passing of Doug Maddox, Holstein breeder and innovative dairyman from Riverdale, California. Mr. Maddox was 75 years old.

Doug Maddox grew up in Oklahoma, under "dirt-poor" conditions. His family did not operate a dairy farm, but that didn't stop him from

entering the dairy industry as a teenager, when a neighbor gave him a bull calf to raise and show and promised he would receive a heifer calf if he went to college. When Doug graduated from Cal Poly, he had grown his herd to 14 cows and 14 heifers.

Maddox established two successful dairies called RuAnn and Maddox Dairies in California. Together they have more than 5,000 Registered Holstein cows and 12,000 total animals. He implemented numerous new technologies on his dairies. Doug, was an innovator, he is credited with building one of the first free-stall barns in California and was also a pioneer in the use of embryo transfer techniques. Maddox was also a leader in the A.I. industry when he created the successful sire proving and



marketing program called Golden Genes. He also was a pioneer in developing export markets for semen and embryos in over 40 countries around the world

In the dairy industry, Doug Maddox was known as a leader among leaders. His advice and counsel was sought by leaders in every phase of the dairy industry.

Doug was a gifted speaker and shared his message of progressive dairy management with dairymen from all over the world. His leadership activities included past president of California DHIA and Holstein Association USA. He received numerous awards, including the National Dairy Shrine Distinguished Cattle Breeder Award, World Ag Expo Outstanding Dairy

Agriculture. Doug's

latest passion was the establishment of a national program for the equitable pricing of milk, which he championed by traveling the country visiting with fellow dairymen.

But above all his accomplishments Doug was very much a family man. He and his lifelong friend Matilda worked side by side to raise a family with strong values and leadership ability. Doug and Matilda's four children are all involved in the family business. Steve and his wife Brenda, and son Steven Jr, operate Maddox Dairy; Patrick and his wife, Mary manage RuAnn Dairy; daughter Liz and her husband Jamie Bledsoe, own and operate Golden Genes; and his daughter Julie Chow serves as the Chief Financial Officer for the entire Maddox enterprises.

Already, the many tributes to this great man are being voiced;

"Doug Maddox was a legend. He was ahead of his time and a visionary that I, like so many in the dairy industry around the globe, admired," says *Continued on Page 3*
