Emerging Leaders

One of the pillars of the National Dairy Shrine mission is to inspire youth. As you flip through this edition of The Chronicle, you will see how your organization is working toward living that element of our mission.

The first representation is the listing of the Emerging Leader award recipients. This recognition is designed to honor those individuals who are 40 years old or younger and have already exemplified exceptional leadership in their young career in the dairy industry. The recipients were chosen from a stellar group of applicants and are indicative of the tremendous bounty of talented individuals the industry is blessed to have working on its behalf.

The second representation is within our

annual listing of scholarship recipients. A total of 278 applications were received across Klussendorf/McKown and National Dairy Shrine applicants spanning 43 universities. From that group 51 National Dairy Shrine scholarship recipients were chosen to receive a total of \$85,000. In addition, seven Klussendorf and McKown scholarship recipients were chosen for another \$10,500. That means we'll give out nearly \$100,000 in scholarships at our annual awards banquet on September 28.

Finally, we're continuing to provide educational resources to young people early in their careers through our webinar program to young professionals. Each quarter we host educational webinars that explore topics of interest to young people in hopes of providing

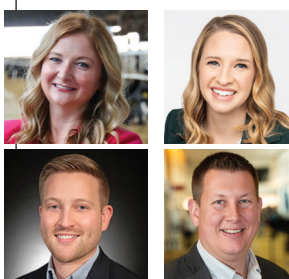

Bob Hagenow is Named National Dairy Shrine's 2026 Guest of Honor

The highest level of recognition from the National Dairy Shrine has been awarded to Bob Hagenow – the 2026 Guest of Honor. This award recognizes a dairy leader who has made significant contributions to the dairy industry. Historically, recipients have been academic educators, researchers, or employees of breeding companies or breed associations. Hagenow joins this prestigious group as one whose primary contributions have been on a volunteer basis, outside his career.

Hagenow's 39-year career with Vita-Plus has certainly been impactful to all around him. He currently supervises and coaches employees in the areas of goal setting, customer service, skill improvement, compensation, budgeting and career development. But his ongoing dairy industry leadership outside of his professional employment demonstrates a boundless energy and enthusiasm for the dairy industry and everyone in it.

One place where Hagenow has devoted a tremendous amount of time is World Dairy Expo. He's been a member of the Board of Directors for many years and is also a member of the Executive Committee for World Dairy Expo. In his role as Secretary/Treasurer for World Dairy Expo, Bob is the "finance person" who keeps World Dairy Expo sustainable with a solid financial footing. During World Dairy Expo, Bob is visible in the Coliseum on the colored shavings as the long-time and highly effective lead ring steward for both the Brown Swiss and Holstein shows. He is constantly on his feet and walks many miles through the lengthy breed shows.

Hagenow also commits nights, weekends and vacation days to a variety of dairy youth activities. The Board President of the Wisconsin 4-H Dairy Fund, coach of county 4-H dairy judging teams, announcer for state youth dairy cattle shows at the Wisconsin State Fair and collegiate dairy club adviser are just a few of them. His constant presence and can-do approach to hosting and promoting youth events and activities is something that many dairy youth remember throughout their careers.

Hagenow's zest for life, engaging personality and the thrill he receives from leaving a posi-

tive impact on others in the dairy industry is admirable, to say the least. All who spoke in his favor for this award are prominent figures in the dairy industry, and many of them used the words "servant leader" to describe him.

"I used to joke that if there was a dairy event in Wisconsin, there was an 80% chance you would see Bob Hagenow there – not just attending, but actively leading and making the experience better," shares Josh Hushon, Strategic Marketing and Technology Director, Cargill Animal Nutrition North America Dairy. "It's simply who he is and how much he cares about our industry and its future. Many leaders talk about servant leadership, but Bob embodies it. The stage is never too big or too small to receive his best. He shows up with the same energy, passion and belief in our industry

no matter who else is there."

Hagenow and his wife Lisa have two daughters, both of whom have inherited his joyful promotion of agriculture. Ashley and Sarah have both served as Alice in Dairyland – the first pair of sisters to ever have earned this role.

Hagenow will be formally recognized at the National Dairy Shrine Awards Banquet on Monday, September 28, 2026, in Madison, Wisconsin. His portrait will be added to the National Dairy Shrine Dairy Hall of Fame and Museum in Fort Atkinson. ●

Dairy Shrine Recognizes the Matt Steiner Family as the 2026 Distinguished Dairy Cattle Breeder

The Matt Steiner Family of Pine-Tree Dairy has been named the 2026 Distinguished Dairy Cattle Breeder. The National Dairy Shrine awards this honor each year to a progressive dairy breeder, who expertly implements sound genetic and business principles and would be considered one of the “all-time greats” in cattle breeding. Through years of careful and strategic development, the Steiner family has become a leader in dairy genetic thought and technology – a prime candidate for the Distinguished Dairy Cattle Breeder honor.

Matt and his wife Gail are third-generation owners of Pine-Tree Dairy, located in Sterling, Ohio. Of their 11 children, several sons and daughters-in-law and dozens of grand and great grandchildren, are involved in the operation today. Matt recalls studying bull books, catalogs and breed publications as a child, and making breeding decisions as a young teenager.

His early interest and involvement in the dairy set him up well for future success. Today, Pine-Tree Dairy consists of around 1,400 milking cows, 1,500 heifers and 140 bulls, consisting of the Holstein, Jersey and Brown Swiss

breeds. The combined RHA is 28,658 milk pounds, 4.7% butterfat, 1,344 fat pounds, 3.6% protein, 1,028 protein pounds. With 20-30 animals flushed bi-weekly, the farm produces more than 1,000 embryos per year.

Matt was an early adopter of innovative genetic tools, including IVF/ET, and breeding for components, NM\$, SCC, PL, DPR, moderate stature and width, and A2A2. When individual matings were popular, his philosophy was “Under most circumstances, more improvement can be made by using three or four real good sires than individual matings using many sires.” He would search for cows that were genetically high in yield, DPR and PL, and sound conformation that were sired by bulls with the same characteristics. This strategy led to the purchase of Wesswood-HC Rudy Missy-ET, whose contributions to the genetic foundation of modern Holstein breeding have been profound.

When Missy was named Global Cow of the Year in 2014, it was the beginning of an era of well-deserved honors and recognition for Pine-Tree dairy and its animals. By 2025, 48 out of

50 heifers at the World Dairy Expo World Classic Sale could be traced back to the Pine-Tree prefix. The farm’s success spans several breeds, having received awards and recognition from The American Jersey Cattle Association, Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association of the USA, and Holstein International. Locally, Pine-Tree Dairy also earned “Conservation Farm of the Year” from the Wayne County Soil and Water Conservation District.

“For over four generations, the Steiners’ philosophy to ‘keep things simple’ and rooted in their devout faith, support of family and love of farming, resulted in a success story few have been able to achieve,” says John Burket, President of Holstein Association of America. “The impact Pine Tree Dairy has made in dairy genetics worldwide will influence dairy cattle breeds for generations into the future.”

The Steiner family will be formally recognized at the National Dairy Shrine Awards Banquet on Monday, September 28, 2026, in Madison, Wisconsin. Their portrait will be added to the National Dairy Shrine Dairy Hall of Fame and Museum in Fort Atkinson. ●



National Dairy Shrine Awards Four with Pioneer Honors

Drs. Larry Chase, Dennis Funk and Richard Grant, along with Drs. Chris Keim and Dan Hornickel from Sunshine Genetics, have been selected as the 2026 National Dairy Shrine Pioneer Award winners. Over their lifetime, these Pioneer individuals have made significant contributions to the dairy industry, and each is recognized as one of the greatest of all-time in their particular field or career.

Dr. Larry Chase has spent his career in dairy nutrition research and extension, focused on providing answers to questions of immediate importance to dairy producers. Through his combined work in extension and research, his findings were rapidly translated into practice, making an immediate impact on the dairy industry. His research spanned several areas, including milk urea nitrogen levels of dairy herds on pasture, uniformity of mixing and delivery of TMR, and evaluation of corn silage hybrids for cow performance, to name a few.

Additionally, Dr. Chase has served as a major or minor professor for four Ph.D. candidates, seven M.S. students and two M.P.S. graduates. He co-taught an applied dairy nutrition course to undergraduates at Cornell for many years. He's been recognized by the Distillers Feed Research Council, the American Dairy Science Association, the New York State Association of Agricultural Agents and more.

Dr. Dennis Funk's career represents a lifetime of transformative leadership in dairy cattle genetics. His impact spans research, education, genetic evaluation systems, global genetic commerce, germplasm preservation and the implementation of breakthrough reproductive and genomic technologies. He holds a bachelor's degree in dairy science, a mas-

ter's degree in animal breeding, and a Ph.D. in animal breeding with a minor in statistics all from Iowa State University.

Through the Holstein Association USA, Funk was the first to develop and implement a formal genetics training program for Holstein field consultants and classifiers. As a professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, he authored dozens of columns for Holstein World and established the Wisconsin Council on Dairy Cattle Breeding. He delivered educational programs to dairy breeders around the world, driving increased international demand and sales of U.S. dairy genetics. He went on to achieve even more through ABS Global and the National Animal Germplasm Program. Funk has also served with or been recognized by nearly a dozen organizations in the dairy industry, and served as President of National Dairy Shrine in 2021.

Dr. Richard Grant has left a national and global impact on dairy nutrition and management, and producer-focused outreach through his leadership, scientific contributions and practical vision for the dairy industry. His career exemplifies the spirit of the Pioneer Award, with field-changing contributions that have fundamentally influenced how the industry thinks, feeds, manages and evolves.

Dr. Grant has shaped the ration formulation standard, especially for fiber needs, advanced understanding of cow behavior and feed bunk dynamics, and driven a more cow-centered approach to management. In partnership with Lallemand Animal Nutrition, he helped establish a Forage Center of Excellence at the Miner Institute. Additionally, his strong commitment to education and mentorship has directly impacted 19 graduate students. He has served on 63 M.S. and Ph.D. committees across the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, University of Vermont, Cornell University and others. The exceptional nature of his work is reflected in awards received from

the University of Nebraska, American Dairy Science Association, the American Society of Agricultural Engineers and more.

Dr. Chris Keim and Dr. Dan Hornickel were the original founders and owners of Sunshine Genetics, Whitewater, Wisconsin. Sunshine Genetics began as a dream made reality in the 1970's by these two friends in the University of Illinois Veterinary school.

They both left their practices and started Sunshine Genetics in 1983, fostering their passion for elite dairy cattle and the newly developing field of advanced reproductive technology. Since that time Drs. Hornickel and Keim have developed a world-renowned embryo transfer business and facility known for providing special care and superior embryo transfer services to cattle breeders from around the world who will confidently "send her to Sunshine."

In 2009, Drs. Keim and Hornickel welcomed Dr. Greg Schueller to join the team. With many years of experience in ET, Dr. Schueller began developing the quickly evolving in-vitro (IVF) program. In 2016, Aaron Proski joined Sunshine Genetics and brought with him a passion for genomics and marketing. Drs. Keim and Hornickel retired in 2017 after having a very long, successful and satisfying career. ●

Inaugural Dairy Shrine Emerging Leaders Recognized for Early-Career Achievements

Winners have been selected for the Emerging Dairy Leader award, a new category of annual recognition from the National Dairy Shrine. These individuals are dairy industry professionals, 40 years old or younger, who have demonstrated exemplary leadership qualities and accomplishments within the dairy industry and their local community, state or region.

“Part of the National Dairy Shrine mission is to inspire young people to do great things in their careers,” says Mike Opperman, Dairy Shrine Executive Director. “With the new Emerging Leader award, we recognize those people who have made significant contributions early in their careers. While it’s important to recognize these accomplishments, we also hope it can inspire other young people to set goals and accomplish great things as they embark on their dairy industry careers.”

This year’s honorees are Bo Harstine, Allison Ryan, Lucas Sjostrom and Emily Yeiser Stepp.

Bo Harstine is the Vice President, Technical Initiatives & Innovation for Select Sires, Inc. His career has been shaped by scientific curiosity, a strong work ethic, and a lifelong connection to agriculture. He has been a leader in important endeavors that have strengthened innovation management and strategic alignment within Select Sires, Inc. This leadership has made an impact far beyond, advancing collaboration, learning and innovation throughout the field.

In addition to his primary professional responsibilities, Harstine has made substantial contributions to his community and the broader scientific and agricultural fields. One of many examples is his work in educational advancement through the Ohio Department of Education Agriculture and Environmental Systems Business and Industry Advisory Committee. His input helps guide curriculum development and ensures that agricultural education remains aligned with modern industry needs.

Allison Ryan is the Director of Marketing and Communications for McCarty Family Farms and MVP Dairy, LLC. She was raised on a dairy farm, and her career path reflects a lifelong commitment to dairy and a clear progression toward industry leadership. As the driving force behind the development and launch of two state-of-the-art dairy education facilities, Ryan has strengthened public trust in dairy, elevated the voice of progressive dairy producers, and crated scalable models for agricultural education that

continue to influence how the industry connects with consumers.

Ryan is extensively involved in her community through her local visitor’s center, Mercer County Farm Bureau and the Mercer County Fairgrounds. Through these roles, she exemplifies civic-minded leadership, ensuring agriculture remains deeply connected to the economic, cultural, and social vitality of her community.

Lucas Sjostrom is an account manager at Specialty Herd Solutions, but he has covered a tremendous amount of ground in his young dairy career. By the age of 39, Sjostrom has been involved in trade missions with Russian investors, several prestigious industry publications, Federal Milk Marketing Order hearings, the Midwest Dairy organization, Minnesota Milk and more. His career’s work has bridged the gap between on-farm production and high-level industry advocacy.

One of his primary achievements has been the successful diversification and expansion of Redhead Creamery, where he currently resides as Head Distiller. Here, Sjostrom’s leadership ensured the long-term sustainability of his own family farm, while also modeling practices and strategies for value-added dairy and agriculture nation-wide. Through all his work and experiences, Sjostrom has made significant impacts not only in production, but also processing and policy.

Emily Yeiser Stepp is the Senior Director of Industry Affairs for Fair-life LLC. She is a positive, energetic representative of the dairy industry who promotes and maintains high standards. Notable achievements throughout her career include helping establish the Center for Dairy Excellence Foundation, training over 400 evaluators through the National Dairy FARM program and managing an on-farm social responsibility program that encompassed 99% of fluid milk supply, over 150 dairy cooperatives and processors, and more than 26,000 farms.

With her background and policy experiences, Yeiser Stepp has proven her ability to address a wide variety of audiences. She is adept at strategic planning, consumer relations, consensus building, reputation and crisis management.

Harstine, Ryan, Sjostrom and Yeiser Stepp will be formally recognized at the National Dairy Shrine Awards Banquet on Monday, September 28, 2026, in Madison, Wisconsin. Their portraits will be added to the National Dairy Shrine Dairy Hall of Fame and Museum in Fort Atkinson. ●
